Access to credit is a civil right Continued access—a privilege

Credit Score

35% is based on your payment history

PAY ALL BILLS ON TIME

30% is based on how much of the available credit have you used.

USE 1/4 OF AVAILABLE CREDIT

15% is the length of credit history

MORE POSITIVE,

LONGER HISTORY

=HIGHER SCORE

10% is new credit you apply for or acquire

Does paying a delinquent debt remove it from the credit report?

No. 35% of the score is based on your payment history. If you pay a debt very late, your credit will be hurt.

Does canceling credit cards improve your score?

No. 30% of your score is based on how much of the available credit you use. If you cancel a credit card, you have reduced your available credit.

Is your credit score the same at all three bureaus?

No. If your lender reports your credit history to credit bureau A but not B & C, credit bureau B & C do not have your payment history to work with.

Does checking your own credit lower your score?

No.

Does shopping around for a loan lower your score?

Generally true for credit cards but not for mortgages and car loans.

Does co-signing make you responsible for the loan?

Yes. If the person you guaranteed for does not pay, you will have to.

Does negotiating a settlement hurt your score?

May be. If you have not paid on an account for 3 years and you pay them now, you lost 35% of the score. When negotiating, ask the lender to report it as PAID, instead of paid as negotiated.

If your credit score is:

1. Above **723**-You are GOLDEN
2. Below 549-Borrow from family or friends
3. In Between-Be Careful!

Your goal is to obtain a credit score over 723 in 2-3 years

The Cost of a Poor Credit Score

On a \$216,000 loan for a 30 years fixed rate mortgage:

1. A person with a score of 760 will pay \$480,600 over 30 years.
2. A person with a score of 620 will pay \$564,120 over 30 years.
3. Thus, a poor score costs you an extra **\$83,520** over 30 years.

Can a debt collector collect a debt that has remained unpaid for more than 7 years?

Yes, so long as the statute of limitations has not run out.

The seven-year statute applies to which debts?

Paid tax liens; Accounts placed for collection or written off as a bad debt; Any other unfavorable information more than seven years old.

Ten year rule applies to:

Bankruptcies

Special rule for lawsuits and judgments:

Stay on the report for seven years or statute of limitations—whichever is longer.

When does the seven-year (plus 180 day) clock start ticking?

From the date when you first missed your regular payment on the debt.

Can a debt collector re-age my account?

No. Re-aging means that the collector reports the debt as becoming delinquent on the date it acquires the debt. This violates Fair Debt Collections Practices Act AND Fair Credit Reporting Act.

If the debt collector re-aged my account, what do I do?

DISPUTE with the credit bureaus AND debt collectors. Ask for validation.

What if I don't remember what this old collection account is all about?

Ask for validation. In other words, ask (in writing) for the collection agency to prove that it owns this debt.

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Credit Repair —you are repaying your existing lenders

1. How much does your budget allow toward repair?
2. Prioritize who will get paid first (i.e. Highest interest rate)
3. Make the budgeted payment to the first debt on your list
4. When this is paid, move to the next debt on your list.
5. If your account is in collection, save. When you have some money to negotiate with, call the creditor. You want to negotiate that the credit bureau reports this debt as “PAID” not as “paid a negotiated amount.” Don’t forget to research the Fair Debt Collections Practices Act.
6. Repair your credit yourself. You can do it. Do not pay anyone for this service.
7. If you need help find an agency certified by the National Foundation for Credit Counseling (NFCC) and recognized by the Bankruptcy Court.

If considering bankruptcy, you must seek credit counseling:

1. File a police report with the Financial Crimes Unit.

4. Open new accounts etc. Insist on password only access to your account.

Rebuild Your Credit (The Credit Builder Program through Artisans’ Bank)

1. A \$500 to \$2000 deposit secured loan.
 - You do not have this money to secure the loan upfront, you build it with your monthly payments called collateral held by the bank.
2. You repay this loan over a 12 -24 months at a fixed rate between 5%-9% APR.
3. At end of the loan term, proceeds may be deposited into a Free Savers Account or a Low Minimum to Open (\$250) 6 Month Balance CD.
4. No Online Banking is allowed during the credit builder term.
5. Automatic Funds Transfers or Electronic Funds Transfer loan payments are not allowed from the collateral account.

• Review your credit reports

• Look for credit report inaccuracy

• If inaccurate, dispute them:

1. Make a copy of your credit report and circle the incorrect items
2. Write to the lender. A week later write to credit bureaus.
3. Send COPIES (never originals) certified, return receipt requested
